

UKRR/KQuIP/West Midlands Regional Day

23 March 2017

Executive Summary

1. Introduction

Clara Day (CD) and Graham Lipkin (GWL) welcomed all members to the UKRR/KQuIP West Midlands Regional day and introduced the learning and development event, to share best practice, to shape Quality Improvements.

GWL presented to the group the UK Renal Registry (UKRR) data showing unwanted regional variation in Home Dialysis, Access to Initiation of Dialysis and Pre-emptive Transplantation rates.

The aim of the day is to share and discuss the UKRR data and impact on renal units/regional networks so units can do the following:

- Know your outcomes-using available data
- Decide on your unit priorities for QI based on this data
- Feel supported to embed QI in your practice
- Identify your QI leads
- Know where to turn to for further support

2. Data, Information and Presentations

CD introduced the information to the group from data sources such as UKRR, NHS England, NHSBT, and UHB Transplant to present the following:

- To ensure measures are helpful and representative of quality and not just easy to measure.
- Various national datasets available to help QI; UKRR, NHSBT and NHS England dashboards. Some measures need 'deeper dive' regionally and within units to gain true local value for QI
- We should not use our units' demographics to excuse outcomes but use QI to ensure outcomes delivered to suit our populations
- Wide difference in home therapies across the region; 'correct' level not known but some units can probably increase
- In general a low transplanting region; difference do exist in pre-emptive listing which needs to continue to be addressed via Transplant First methodology
