The day began with Ian Stott, Regional Lead providing an update on future QI support and re-establishing the renal network. [Click here](#) to view his presentation

Afterwards, the attendees watched a TED talk from Maddie Warren, a patient who has lived on dialysis for 16+ years. [Click here](#)

Next, each of the unit QI leads presented their project improvements. Each unit used a driver diagram and PDSA cycle to share their work and used at least one run chart from their data collection tool Life QI.



Gary Carlisle from Bradford was very open and honest re their progress with the project. They have dealt with challenges around workforce and are ready to move forward.

Vicky Fairclough from Doncaster shared their increase numbers in lost AV fistulas. They have introduced the BRS Pre Cannulation Assessment tool and given each nurse their own stethoscope on the unit which has raised staff morale.



Mark Wright from Leeds shared their achievement in implementing the pre assessment tool; as Leeds called it FAT (Fistula Assessment Tool) to their 440 patients. Now they are looking to increase their use of the sonosite ultrasound and implement a Post Cannulation check list.



Maggie Higginbotham from York was open and honest about their challenges due to workforce which have now been addressed. They plan to reintroduce the project again in the new year.



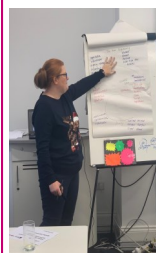
Sonia Crawford from Easingwold shared their increase in number of cannulation technique, which was very well received by her peers in the room. They are working on individual care plans by using an acetate to road map the patients fistula which will increase ropeladder use.



After a coffee break, KQuIP Programme Lead, Julie Slevin, provided a fun and interactive session on CREATIVITY. She encouraged the attendees to look at their project with a different perspective, thus generating innovative ideas for improvement.



Leeanne Lockley, KQuIP Programme Lead, delivered a presentation on TRANSITION AND CHANGE. This made the attendees think about how people felt during change and provided ideas on how to avoid their staff having negative feelings around change. Following on from lunch and a photo opportunity in the venue's winter wonderland, Katie Fielding, MAGIC National Project lead, provided the attendees with an update on MAGIC. There was a great discussion in the room about the change of patient experience measurement and how this could potentially impact the region going forward. One of the key elements of MAGIC is measurement. Katie has been working collaboratively with UK Renal Registry to produce a MAGIC data collection platform. Attendees are interested in signing up to use it in their unit. Each unit spent some time planning their next 30-60-90 days Bradford; Doncaster; Leeds; York and Easingwold

KQuIP will confirm the date, time and venue for this event and circulate an invitation

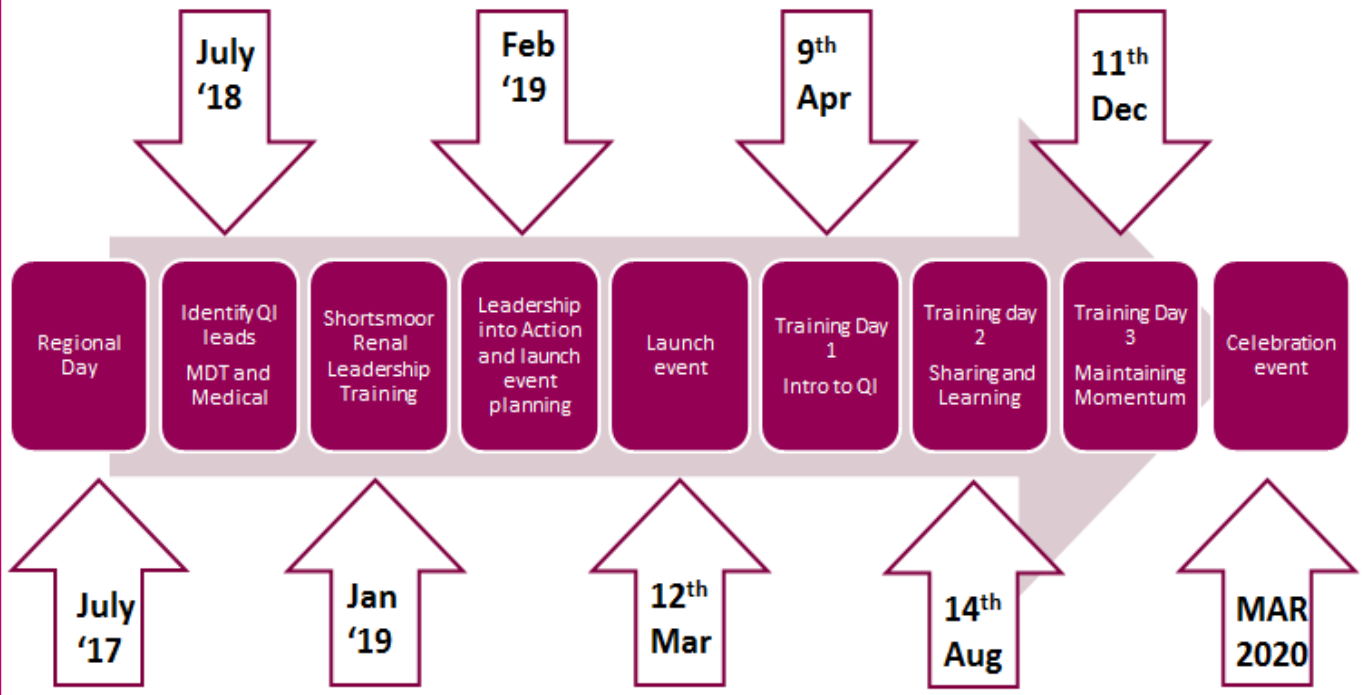
KQuIP to arrange follow up visits with each unit
